Dear Families:

I hope the first month of 2023 has been good to you as we welcome February and look forward to celebrating our Week of Giving, February 13-21, that offers us the opportunity to celebrate and support our school specifically. We affectionately call this week Alter Love Week as it coincides with Valentine's Day. Our week of giving directly supports the Annual Fund which is the backbone of our advancement program as it builds revenues to supplement the school budget by funding school programs and campus projects. Last year just under \$400,000 was raised and used for financial aid and services for our 515 students. In addition, because we recognize that we are living in extraordinary times, we have purposefully minimized tuition increases and awarded approximately \$900,000 in financial aid and scholarships so we can continue to make Catholic Education attainable for families.

We do not underestimate the value of your investment in your children, and our school. We currently have a \$15,000 matching gift to challenge our community to contribute to the annual fund. As our week of giving approaches, our goal is to grow that matching gift to \$100,000 and surpass the \$200,000 we raised during last year's event. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you would like to add to that matching gift or if you know of a corporation that would like to contribute.

Students, faculty, and staff will host our 3rd annual telethon on Wednesday, February 15th, and it will be, once again, televised on <u>AlterKnights.tv</u> beginning at 6:30 p.m. If you or your child would like to volunteer to make calls, we would appreciate having you as a part of the event. If not, I hope you will tune in and join us!

I believe that God has great things in store for all of us this year, and for our school. Thank you for your love and support as we continue to plan, dream and accomplish great things for our students and our school. It would not be possible without all of you!

Have you ever received a gift so overwhelmingly wonderful or generous that you are left speechless? If you know me, being speechless is truly a feat. However, I have been left speechless more than once in the last few months by the generosity of people in my life. Of course, the generosity of others in giving presents to me was wonderful, but my eyes have been opened to something new: gifts for my children.

Between birthdays and holidays or just a random "thought you would like this," my children have been the recipients of so many people's generosity and faithfulness. (Note: we haven't had any major hardships or struggles - just plain and beautiful generosity.) They have received fuzzy socks, ice cream dates, candies, gift cards to their favorite places, a ride to and from practices or after school dates, and even homemade dinners while I am on Kairos retreats. Most of us charitably give in some way or another throughout the year to various causes and organizations; so how do we make Lent look different regarding our almsgiving?

Perhaps you will add to your parish's or even Alter's Lenten project this year, which is wonderful. But what if we also viewed Almsgiving and this time of Lent as simply an opportunity to love God's children? Find the area, the cause, the organization, the person, or people, that pulls and tugs at your heart and give that place or person your time, money, or talent. Our giving to others does not always have to be monetary! I imagine God is delighted when we, as children, choose to love other children in creation and society. 


