Seasons, Routine, and Prayer

I'm admittedly one of those people who doesn't like change. I'd like to think I can be mostly spontaneous and flexible, but I just love a good routine. I'm married to someone who would rearrange furniture weekly and who goes a different way home from Church on a Sunday "for fun" (while I'm asking the question "where are we going?!") so I have had to adapt in many ways in my family life! I do well with seasons and routines even in my prayer life. While I love summertime so much, it certainly has affected my prayer routine.

During the school year, I have a set time that I go into the Chapel during the school day and pray. Each day may look a little different. I always pray for the intentions of our students, staff, and families, but depending on what else I have going on in my life, the prayers look different. Sometimes I just sit in the peace and quiet and soak up God's presence. Sometimes I find myself in such a time of Thanksgiving that my prayer is just a rambling list of gratitude. I've been angry before and brought my frustrations to the Lord, too. Most often, I find myself asking God to guide me and help me to do whatever it is that he has called me to do. So, while the prayers I pray and even my mood and emotions look different, it's still prayer and I still have the routine of coming into the Chapel to pray each day. The best part is I don't really stress or think too hard about how or what I'm going to pray. I just show up and it's like my heart knows the routine, too.

During the summer, I have fallen out of my routine of my prayer time in the Chapel. Though my summertime hours are different, I literally walk through the Chapel every day I'm at work to get to my office, but I never fully established my summer routine of prayer. As we're approaching the beginning of the school year and everything is ramping up, I find that brings with it some of what I'd like to call "August Anxiety." As my planner and days are filled with to-dos and meetings, it's easy to feel like you are spinning and needing something to grab onto to ground yourself. I realized as I walked into the Chapel this week, I had not fully given myself a routine of prayer this summer and it has left me feeling frazzled.

Maybe your summer was amazing, and you did a much better job of scheduling your prayer life than I, but if not, I hope you look at the beginning of the school year as an opportunity to begin again. The great thing about God is whether or not we carved out time to spend with God this summer, God was there. God's love for us is not dependent on whether we recognized God or even said "hi" often.

At a youth conference years ago, a speaker said, "Prayer doesn't help our relationship with God, it IS our relationship with God." May we squelch the "August Anxieties" with our new school routine and carve away some time in our day each day to talk to God and to listen, too. And as always, the Chapel doors are open all the time for prayer; I invite you into our beautiful Chapel to build on your relationship with God this school year!

Sgt. Kevin Lannon '80 Honored for Ultimate Sacrifice

Class of 1980 Alter alum, Army Ranger **Sgt. Kevin Lannon**, will be remembered for his ultimate sacrifice. He was killed in action in 1983 during Operation Urgent Fury. On September 1, at a dedication ceremony, a section of St. Route 48 will be named in his honor. The portion of St. Route 48 from E. David Rd. to Rahn Rd. will be dedicated and named for Sgt. Lannon. State and Kettering officials including Representative Andrea White and Mayor Peggy Lehner will present at the ceremony being held at David's Church beginning at 2:00 p.m. Another section of the roadway will honor fallen Fairmont alum Sgt. Cameron Thomas.

Alter's band will participate in the ceremony as they play the Star-Spangled Banner and will combine with Fairmont's band to pay tribute to both soldiers.



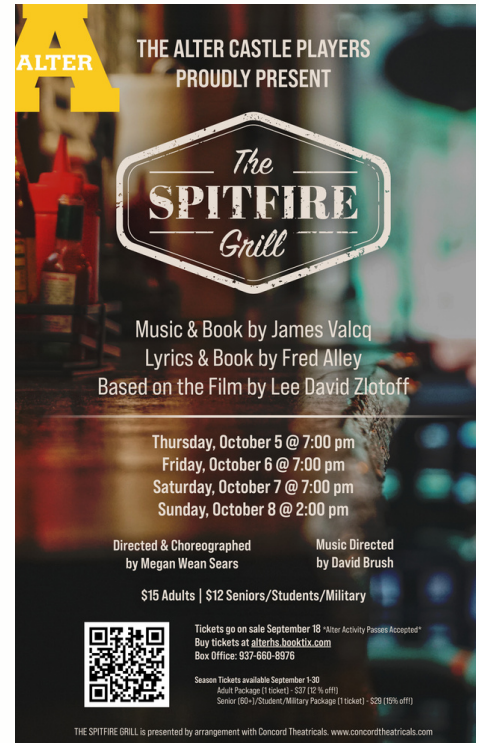
**** WHAT IS SPITFIRE ABOUT?** Based on the hit 1996 film, THE SPITFIRE GRILL is a heartwarming and inspirational musical tale of redemption, perseverance and family. Set in a small Wisconsin town, the show features a gorgeous, soulful score.

A feisty parolee follows her dreams, based on a page from an old travel book to a small town in Wisconsin and finds a place for herself working at Hannah's Spitfire Grill. The Grill is for sale, but there are no takers for the only eatery in the depressed town, so newcomer Percy convinces Hannah to raffle it off. Entry fees are one hundred dollars and the best essay on why you want the Grill wins. Soon, mail arrives by the wheelbarrow and things really start cookin' at the Spitfire Grill.

- The musical itself is entirely about forgiveness, the long lasting effect of trauma and loss on several characters, and how healing is possible and even inevitable. Percy finds a new life in a small Wisconsin town where she finds - for the first time - friends and family who lift her up and provide her with a future she never had or dreamed possible.
- The musical also deals with Veteran PTSD as a major character suffers from PTSD after a short stint serving and then deserting in Vietnam. Percy - who herself understands life after trauma - reaches out to someone else in similar situations. Helping others in trauma is how we heal our own trauma.

WHY THIS SHOW? We feel the show speaks so directly to what we are called to do - to forgive and heal - and find a new way forward after difficult and life-changing circumstances - and even one's own mistakes. There is always salvation available for those who seek it. No one is a lost cause. Community is vital to how we discover who we are.
