# Why Do We Go To Mass?

Two of my three children have received their First Communion, and this year my youngest has started 2nd grade and his Sacramental Preparation for May. There is nothing like leading your child (even if it's your third time) through the process of First Communion Preparation. Your calendar gets filled with Jesus Retreats, meetings, Reconciliation Preparation, and even paperwork for what outfit to buy. Despite all the meetings and requirements, one essential question gets revisited often: how are we preparing our children at home to receive Jesus? It's a loaded question to answer even in my house for a campus-minister-mom and a religion-teacher-dad!

I think what makes the year of preparation so meaningful is that time seems to slow down for a brief moment; and as we attempt to teach our youngest son why going to Mass is so important, it naturally helps solidify our own faith. As we guide our children in their faith lives, they are looking directly at US for what that faith life means. Yes, our son receives religious formation in his Catholic school and at his extra preparation days, but he is watching us every single Sunday to see how it is that we worship Jesus at Mass. It certainly has jump started the conversations between my husband and I in our Sunday reflections as we ask the question how are we preparing him for something so integral to our own lives?

In a similar way, I'm asking myself the same question to our students here at Alter. Each month, we are blessed to gather as a community and pray together and worship at our All School Mass. The question becomes: Why? Why do we go to Mass each month as a school? I think there are many ways we could answer that question, but mostly we go to our monthly Mass because the more we come close to God, the more we become like Him. Mass is where we meet God's holy presence differently than anywhere else.

As we strive to grow as a community of believers, the more we meet God's holy presence, I hope the more holy we can become. We have a tight schedule here at Alter; yet we make time each month to stop every subject and teaching moment to do one thing: to become closer to God.

It is complex and yet so beautifully simple. I am bringing my own children to Mass to help them know and love God and the same is true of our Alter community. Of course, having the right mindset when we come to Mass helps us actually become closer to God. Next month, I'll answer the question: "Why should I participate in Mass?"

As our family challenges ourselves this year to slow down each Sunday and become more cognizant and aware of our time during weekly Mass, I challenge our school community this year in the same way. If we view going to our monthly Mass as an opportunity to grow closer to God, then I believe that we as a community can only get better and be better. Ultimately, we know that Eucharist means "thanksgiving." Simply coming to Mass with a heart turned to gratitude is a great step into the right direction of becoming closer to God as we enter Mass each month.


Our first quarter ends on October 6th. To become a successful Knight, remember that it requires desire, dedication, hard work and the ability to ask for help when it is needed.

#### Seniors:

Another busy college application season is underway, and the Class of 2024 is already moving at a fast pace! They have been doing a fantastic job of staying on top of all the steps in the process. Please be reminded of the following deadlines for submission of transcript requests:

- ·Applications with a November 1st deadline must be received in the Guidance office by Monday, October 2nd
- ·Applications with a December 1st deadline must be received in the Guidance office by Wednesday, November 1st
- ·Applications needing to be mailed prior to Christmas break must be received in the Guidance office by Wednesday, November 15th

High school transcripts required for college admission are only being requested via Naviance. Utilizing this software is tremendously useful for students, counselors, and admissions offices. Naviance aids greatly with communication and timely submission of materials. If students need help accessing their Naviance account, please have them contact their individual counselor. The yellow folder must be returned to Guidance once seniors are ready to have transcripts sent. At any time, if you have questions or concerns regarding this often-stressful process, please don't hesitate to speak to one of the counselors.

**Attention Senior Parents:** Please join us for our Senior Parent Night which will be held on Thursday, September 14th at 6:30 p.m. in Alter's Theatre. We will discuss how your students will be completing college applications and how you can best support them. We will also discuss Alter's protocol for sending transcripts and other paperwork. Please make a plan to attend this very informative meeting!

#### Juniors:

An important email was sent to students and parents in the junior class to provide all the details about visits from college admissions staff. These individuals represent schools from around the country and will be stopping by Alter this fall. For details on school visiting, all the times and dates, and to sign up, please see Mrs. Brown or Ms. Hammaker in the Guidance office.

Welcome to another school year. Students are settling into a routine, keeping up with academics, and juggling extracurriculars. As you may know there are many extracurriculars at Alter High School. For a school our size we have opportunities for all students to get involved. There are academic opportunities such as Academic Team, Alter Scholars, National Honor Society, and Science Olympiad. We pride ourselves on the number of students who are committed to serving others through the National Honor Society and Key Club, which is one of the largest service organizations in the state of Ohio. We have clubs that encompass the wide variety of our student's interests such as Art, Ecology, Languages, and Investment.

With the increase in teen suicide and mental health crisis, we have a peer-to-peer suicide prevention program called Hope Squad. These individuals were chosen by their classmates as someone they could easily talk to about problems or concerns in their lives. They receive specialized training to learn how to assist students in need.

In addition, we have several groups that allow students to grow in their faith journey. Peer ministers serve their fellow students by sharing their faith, skills, talents, and friendship. Peer ministers help to carry out the Catholic mission of the school through liturgies, retreats, prayer, service, and other activities. Upper Room is focused on making known the reality that the Kingdom of God is present and can be lived out here and now! It includes captivating testimonies by students and/or outside speakers about what God has done in their lives, small group discussions, meditations, praise and worship, prayer workshops, and more.

# **TECHNOLOGY**

#### Mrs. Debbie Portman, Director of Technology:

I am excited and thankful for the new position as Director of Technology and the opportunity for professional growth. It is my responsibility to oversee all the technology for the school community. This is done with the assistance of Mr. Michael Dixon.

Many good things have been happening with the technology department over the summer and as the school year begins. In my first summer in this new position, we successfully imaged 130 freshman computers, reimaged 400 computers for returning students, and 50 computers for teachers, providing new Dell computers for all staff. We upgraded our Internet Service Provider to Alta Fiber running at 1gig and installed a backup fiber running at 500 mg through Crown Castle. The firewall, printing system, badging system, and several administrative computers were also updated during the summer. Six sessions were held this summer to get the incoming freshman class set up on their devices and start to teach them about the school technology. We also spent time cleaning up some of our systems, purging users no longer associated with Alter.

As the school year starts, we have successfully implemented Moodle and DyKnow for teacher and student use. On any given day, Mr. Dixon and I serve students and staff by spending time troubleshooting technology issues. We work on a continual basis to educate ourselves on the latest technology and how it would benefit our school community.

Mr. Dixon and I are available daily to help students with technological needs related to their computers. If they are having connection issues, software problems including forgetting passwords, damaged something on their computer such as a cracked screen or lost keys, they need to stop in to see Mr. Dixon in room 310 or me in the office next to the printers on the second floor. They do not need to make an appointment, just stop by. Our goal is to help them be able to be back in class as quickly as possible with fully functional equipment. We look forward to serving the students and staff this school year.

They seek to empower students to navigate their complex, multi-year process from as early as their freshman year. Class 101 is passionate about helping young people find their future, and we are excited to have them come along side our students!

#### Class 101

A college planner can be found in the Taylor Center each Wednesday for one-on-one services with our seniors. As the year progresses, they will also be available to underclassmen.

In addition to Wednesday sessions, special planning days have been created to further aid our students. Class 101 has met with the senior class to go over group lessons on creating a college list and filling out the common application. On September 11th, an essay writing workshop for seniors will be held. Future class meetings will be held with underclassmen, as well.

Class 101 is also supporting our parents and families by providing workshops for them! The senior parents enjoyed a college application meeting earlier in the year. On September 13th, a college planning timeline meeting will be hosted at 7:00 p.m. for all underclassmen parents.

In semester two, Class 101 will host additional college planning meetings for underclassmen families, one directed at grades 9 and 10, and one specifically for grade 11 in preparation for their upcoming college application season.

The partnership between Class 101 and Alter High School is the first of its kind in the nation and we are very proud to be paving the way to even greater long-term success for our graduates.

#### Alter High School Fall Testing Update:

**PSAT:** The PSAT will be given to all juniors on October 11th. This test is mandatory, and is the qualifying test for the National Merit program.

**Pre-ACT:** Alter is excited to host our first sitting of the Pre-ACT on October 18th. This test is mandatory for all sophomores. Once results are in, students will be able to use predictive data to determine future scores and subjects in which they need further study.

**High School Placement Test**: Incoming 8th grade students are required to take the High School Placement Test as part of the admissions process. ## **Meet DASH**


