Why Should We Participate in Mass?

Have you ever been to a concert, sporting event, or show where everyone is just SO into it?! The event where no one can imagine sitting down because the moment is so intense that it requires standing? Or maybe instead of staring at your phone, you can't help but talk to the people around you and laugh and share in the moment even though they are strangers. While I personally didn't attend an event like that THIS summer, I have a feeling a lot of people did happen to catch a certain singer's concert where bracelets, hugs, and a lot of joy was shared. People left there feeling intense feelings of connectedness and happiness.

What makes these events seem so magical and wonderful? I have been to other events where when I went home, I certainly didn't feel like I was a part of something, or I may have not spoken to a single stranger. I've been to sporting events where despite the overall energy of the stadium, my section was subdued and therefore I did not leave with the same elated feelings. While it doesn't make one event more special than another or "better", it does leave us with a different feeling.

The same phenomenon I mentioned above about a concert or sporting event, I have also witnessed at religious events and retreats. I even noticed it at Kairos! During our Kairos retreat (and other like events), there seems to be energy and excitement; often students will come home and want to re-create those feelings of joy and closeness to the Lord, and they can't understand why it doesn't feel the same. Does that mean God is only present in those big moments or those large Masses we find on retreats? Of course, not! We associate the feelings we have with that event, but really, I think that we have more of those feelings because of those around us. We find ourselves more engaged in that Mass or event because we are with a group of people who have chosen to be truly present in the moment.

God is not only revealed in large religious events, concerts, and retreats. But I tend to think we are more aware of him in those moments because of two things: our mindset and the people around us. The same is true of other large events and moments; our mindset and those around us truly can change our feelings of the moment. It doesn't change what happens, but it changes how we experience them.

The same is true of Mass. When we go to our All School Mass, our mindset and participation changes the experience for ourselves AND one another. We are a community. How we act and participate (or do not) will affect those around us! The gift of the Mass is that whether you choose to be engaged, Jesus is still present in the Eucharist. However, we all want to participate in Mass with others around us who are also participating; no one wants to be the only one singing or saying a response to a prayer.

So, I encourage you, whether it be an All School Mass or a Sunday Mass, pick up your hymnal and use your voice to participate! Join your voice with others around you in community to worship in word and song. We are called in our faith not simply to just attend Mass, but to participate. Just like your participation at a concert or a sporting event is a testimony to your care for the cause or person, participation at Mass is a testimony of our belief in God's holiness and our hope of salvation. Your mindset and participation not only testify to your own faith, but it helps others in their faith journey, too!

Admissions Update For The Month of October

Hello Alter Students, Families, and Friends!

Admissions activities for the Class of 2028 are in full swing, and it was a pleasure to welcome prospective students to campus throughout the month of September! October will bring additional opportunities for eighth-grade students to explore Alter through events and shadow days and will begin preparation for the High School Placement Test, which will be administered on Saturday, November 18th, 2023.

The High School Placement Test (often referred to as simply the HSPT) is an important element of the admissions process at Archbishop Alter High School, and all high schools within the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. At Alter, the results of the HSPT are used to inform admissions decisions, aid in academic placement, and provide a "level playing field" for our student applicants (who, in the Class of 2027, came from more than 25 different middle schools!)

The High School Placement Test contains five subtests made up entirely of multiple-choice questions. The Verbal Skills subtest measures skills such as understanding of synonyms, antonyms, verbal analogies, verbal classifications; and logical reasoning. The Quantitative Skills subtest includes number series, number manipulations, and geometric and non-geometric quantitative comparison items. The Reading subtest looks at comprehension skills such as the ability to remember important ideas and details, make logical inferences, and understand vocabulary in context. The Mathematics subtest evaluates computation and problemsolving skills, including a student's knowledge of geometry, algebra and statistics. The Language subtest evaluates skills in standard English convention: punctuation, capitalization, spelling, grammar, and composition.

To prepare for the HSPT, Alter High School offers an hour-long course which reviews testing strategies and the format and content of the test. Registration for this course, as well as the HSPT itself, is open and available at the following link: alterhs.org/class-of-2028/#hspt.

In general, and as with most standardized tests, students are encouraged to listen to and read directions carefully, use their time wisely (trying not to spend too much time on any one test item), read questions thoroughly, answer every question (especially as there is no penalty for guessing!), and check their work if time permits. As a parent, the most important thing you can do to help your child be successful is make sure that they get a good night's sleep and have a healthy breakfast before heading to Alter to test. Encourage them to do their best but assure them that the HSPT is only one aspect of their application to Alter.

The HSPT provides the admissions and educational staff at Alter with valuable information that aids us in making the best recommendations for our students. The information that is gathered from this standardized measure is always used alongside report cards, teacher recommendations, and other holistic measures of student potential and achievement in decision-making. It is our intention to fully consider all students who have an interest in becoming an Alter Knight. If you have any specific questions about the HSPT, or about the admissions process, please do not hesitate to reach out!

Learning for Success

Here at Alter we are blessed to have a variety of different learning styles. These include students who are visual, kinesthetic, read-write learners and auditory. Different learning styles require different study practices.

Visual learners learn by reading or seeing pictures. They understand and remember things by sight and can picture what they are learning in their head. These students learn best by using methods that are primarily visual so highlighting material and using flashcards are great for these students.

Kinesthetic learners retain information by doing, rather than only by seeing or listening. These students learn more through experiencing the concepts taught in class. Real-world examples and experiments create stronger memory connections for these learners.

Read-write learners learn primarily by reading and writing. This type of learner prefers to learn information by reading notes, handouts, and textbooks. These learners make use of dictionaries and other reference materials. They also benefit by rewriting notes and rereading notes silently. Auditory learners learn best by listening. These students benefit from lectures, listening to recordings and talking to themselves. Finding a study buddy, sitting near the front of the room and repeating facts and assignments aloud are all beneficial.

Speaking with your child and determining what type of learner they are will help with what type of study skills work best for them. No matter what type of learner your child is, remind them to stay organized, write down every assignment, turn in assignments, communicate with teachers, and establish a study zone. When studying, remind them to be active in the process of engaging with material, comprehending, and integrating new knowledge. Remind them not to procrastinate, to take care of themselves and get plenty of rest, which are all keys to success.

Requests with a December 1st deadline must be received in the guidance office by Wednesday, November 1st.

Requests to be submitted before Christmas break must be received in the guidance office by Wednesday, November 15th.

At any time, if you have any questions or concerns regarding this often-stressful process, please don't hesitate to speak to one of the counselors. Mrs. DeRosa from Class 101 is also exceptionally helpful in all thing's college applications and scholarships!

As for scholarships, please know that all opportunities of which Guidance is aware are readily available to view on Naviance. A list of those scholarships can be found under the "Scholarships & Money" section under the "Colleges" tab in Naviance. New scholarships will be added often, particularly as we approach the New Year.

In-School College Visits (Juniors & Seniors):

Juniors and Seniors are allowed up to 5 excused, in-school college visits and must sign up at least one school day prior. Seniors will use their Naviance account to sign up while Juniors will need to sign up in Guidance. Students are expected to make up any missed work.

It is hard to believe that the end of the first quarter is here. Students are settling into their routines at school and juggling extracurriculars. Like any other year, the end of the quarter also brings another level of stress. The newness of high school for the freshmen fades into the understanding that high school is going to be hard work. Deadlines need to be met, sleep sometimes must be put on the back burner after a long night of practice and studying. Sophomores and Juniors are taking their first AP classes and adjusting to the increased expectations of such rigorous courses. Seniors are busy applying to college and worrying if they will be accepted into their top choice, and the realization that the relationships they have built over the last 4 years with classmates, friends and teachers are coming to a close.

At Alter, we have many support services available to help students manage these stresses and the strain on their mental health and well-being. A few times a week our Student Assistance Team meets to discuss students who need academic, behavioral, emotional, mental, and medical assistance. We work with the students and teachers to set up individual tutoring or through peer study tables with the help of the National Honor Society. Study Tables are offered before and after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays. No appointment is needed. We also have the Hope Squad students who have been trained specifically to be good listeners and to offer encouragement to students in need, and to refer to an adult moderator if the stress has turned into a crisis. Twice a year we have Mental Health Days. These days offer time away from their usual responsibilities with the intention of recharging and rejuvenating their mental health. The intent is to alleviate distress while improving attitude, morale, and overall well-being.

Please don't hesitate to reach out to teachers, counselors, or any staff member if you need assistance. We are here to help!

Welcome to October. As the first quarter is coming to a close, the Tech Dept. would like to send out informational reminders regarding student computers. The student computers are covered under warranty. The warranty does not cover the battery of the computer, the stylus, charger, or sleeve. If something happens to any of the items that are not covered, then the family is responsible for replacement. At the end of this article, please find the links for reordering a stylus and charger. Make sure to click the proper link for your student's device. If your student has an issue with their computer, please have them take it to Mr. Dixon in room 310 to assess the issue. If it needs to be repaired, he will take care of it as soon as possible.

On October 11th, the juniors will take the PSAT. The PSAT will be taken using the students' computers. Last week the Tech Dept. visited every Junior Theology class and helped the students set up Bluebook. To be successful on test day, it is important for the students to remember to charge their computer completely the evening before the test. On test day, the juniors must bring their device and charger with them to school. Part of the pretest procedures will be to restart computers on campus and shut down any apps that automatically run, such as Spotify, so they do not interfere with the test.



The ONLY form that you still need to print, have a physician complete and sign, and file with the Athletic Trainers, is the actual OHSAA Physical Form. Once a parent is registered on FinalForms, they will be able to access and print that form for their student's physician to fill out. The physical form must be completed by the doctor and by law Alter is required to have a signed copy on file. Once your student's completed physical is received by the Athletic Trainers, they will input the expiration date into FinalForms and then you will receive automatic notifications when your student's forms need to be updated (annually). 




