Then, starting in January, a prompt will be presented each Monday in Theology class; on Friday of that same week, we will meet in God Squads to discuss the prompt again and begin to discover those "holy moments" that we had during the week.

There is no previous theology class or faith moment that you need to simply be open to the holy moments God seeks to invite into your life. To me, this is the best part of this project! Seeking holy moments in our days can start now! Perhaps, it is as simple as driving to school or work each morning that you ask God to show you the holy moments in your life. For me, it will continue to be asking and allowing God to "re-arrange" my days for the holy moments He has in store for me! May we grow as a community with our eyes open to those moments of being open to God!

- o Our final ALTER: ALL ACCESS event, highlighting our academic programs and the admissions process, will be held on Thursday, November 9th at 6:00 p.m. Join us to learn more about our exemplary academics from our teachers and have your admissions questions answered by our admissions team.
- o Our final shadow day of 2023 will take place on Thursday, November 16th. A few spaces are still available, and we encourage you to spend a day on campus to experience Alter firsthand.
- o High School Placement Test preparation classes are underway, with several dates still available for registration.
- o The High School Placement Test will be administered at Alter on Saturday, November 18th from 8:30 a.m. 12 noon. The HSPT is required for admission to Archbishop Alter High School.
- o All applications for admission, scholarship applications, and financial aid applications are due Friday, December 1st, 2023.

More importantly, I remind our prospective students that Alter is a school filled with "alreadys" and "not yets." Our teaching staff consists of 45 teachers who have a combined average of over 17 years of teaching experience. Seniors:

Scholarships, both merit scholarships offered through the school and outside scholarship opportunities, can play a big role in making the best financial decisions regarding college cost. After Christmas break and into the New Year, more scholarship opportunities open up. Any college scholarships, of which we are aware, are listed in Naviance under "Scholarships & Money" in the Colleges tab. Mrs. DeRosa, our Class 101 representative, is also a wonderful resource for scholarship searching, so tap into her wealth of knowledge! Please note that a particular college's website may have specific financial aid/scholarship/grant information on their Financial Aid pages.

An integral part of college financing is the completion and filing of the Federal Application for Financial Student Aid (FAFSA). Please be aware that filing the FAFSA is free, and you should never pay a fee to apply. Going to https://studentaid.gov/fafsa will enable you to complete and submit the FAFSA online. Colleges have various deadlines for submission, so be aware of those dates pertaining to your student's school(s). If you are having difficulty in completing a part of the FAFSA or have any questions, your student's potential college is the best resource as they are experts in all things financial aid.

Please join us for our annual College Financial Aid Night on Thursday, January 18th at 6:30 p.m. in Alter's theatre. This informational session provides much-needed advice and direction on the financial aid process for both public and private universities. The event will once again be presented by Dr. Katherine Gonzalez, who always does an outstanding job of addressing the many concerns which surround college funding.

All Students:

As always, if a student is experiencing academic challenges in the classroom, contacting the teacher directly to find help is the best way to find resolution. Parents and students are always welcome to talk with the counselors about any concerns here at Alter by calling or emailing the Guidance Office.

Reminders for Students

It is hard to believe that Thanksgiving is right around the corner. Some extracurriculars are wrapping up, but that does not mean that our students have extra time on their hands. We are entering the time of year when their outside interests and events take on a life of their own. Often, I receive questions regarding the guidelines for students missing school for club sports, family events, and college visits. As a reminder, a written request must be submitted to the attendance secretary at least three school days prior to the absence. Mrs. Bockrath will prepare a form for the student to take around to their teachers to afford them the opportunity to talk about what they may be missing. The form is then returned to the main office after all teachers have been notified. Following this procedure gives teachers and students an opportunity to discuss work that can be given in advance, so students do not fall behind, especially for a prolonged absence. Remember that students have as many days as they were out to make up their work.

Three college visits are permitted per year for juniors and seniors. Students should obtain a college visitation form from the main office. This form should be completed by the admission office at the college while on their visit. The completed form should be returned to the main office the day after the visit for the absence to be excused. If an additional day is needed for travel, please send a note to the office on the day the student signs up for the visit. Any questions regarding this procedure can be directed to the main office.

Welcome to November. This month we would like to share some typical problems we see with student computers and how to fix the issues. Your computers are like your brains. Sometimes when our brains get exhausted, we need to stop, rest and recharge them. Computers need the same things. They can get exhausted running 24/7 and bogged down if there are too many documents open or too many tabs open in a web browser; especially if one or more of the tabs are streaming something. Get into the habit of closing tabs and documents. Shut down your computer as often as you can so it can rest from running 24/7. If you need to be able to go back to your tabs in the future, consider bookmarking them for ease of use. It is also important to get into the habit of restarting your computer at least once a week on campus. This allows critical updates to be performed. If you need help with any of this, see someone in the Tech Dept.

If you are unable to print, before you start to panic, check to make sure you are on the WIFI. Alter Guest WIFI is not able to access the printers. To access the WIFI, click on the symbol on the bottom right side of the task bar and select ALTER WIFI. If you are still having issues connecting, stop into the Tech Dept. and have us check it out for you.

Have you cleaned your screen lately? To do so, use a dry microfiber cloth when your computer is turned off to gently wipe the surface. Are you missing your stylus or is your charger not working? Here are the re-order links for stylus and charger by grade level:

An Interview with Class 101's Karen DeRosa

We have been so blessed to have started our collaboration with Class 101 this school year. Karen DeRosa has helped our seniors to be extremely prepared and far less stressed about the college season. Here are some commonly asked questions about our partnership with Class 101:

What does a day at Alter typically look like for you?

Working with amazing students, I am not sure there is ever a "typical" day! The heart of the Class 101 partnership with Alter is to provide resources that support each individual student on his/her journey to success after high school. That means every student should access Class 101 differently to meet their unique needs. We are housed in the Taylor Center, and we host open office hours from the first bell until the end of the day. It is a workshop atmosphere for students to come in and work on college planning with Class 101 on hand to offer advice and resources. On occasion, we can meet with students at 7:15 a.m. or after school.

What's your favorite part so far about working with Alter students?

We genuinely love them all. I think you often hear that Alter students are polite, respectful, and kind. I wholeheartedly agree. But my favorite thing about them as a group is their sense of optimism and the constant encouragement they share with each other. High school is a place to dream big, and those dreams are authentically supported at Alter.

How many Alter seniors have worked with you so far?

We've held more than 270 unique student interactions with 70 percent of Alter's seniors. We also met with all seniors during an assembly in August to introduce Class 101, open the Common App, discuss the college list, and even start writing essays.

Once the senior college applications slow down, how will Class 101 shift to working with underclassmen?

From August through October, we have focused our attention on seniors. In November, we will open our services to the Class of 2025 (Juniors). Class 101 will collaborate with the Alter counselors to go into classes as the juniors learn how to access their college planning tools. Class 101 will also walk all juniors through a guided career interest exercise and also provide the rationale for why it is important to draft a college list and visit colleges this year!

In January, we will host a Scholarship Workshop for seniors and a Resume Workshop for juniors. We will continue to look for ways to have the biggest impact. As we propose a long term plan, please know that we are ready to adapt in ways that help your students and families.

Is this the same service as college planning with Class 101?

No, it is different. We are bringing four of our ten services to Alter, and these services are being provided in a group setting instead of in a one to one, personalized college planning setting. It's a less personal approach, but I can already see that it supports Alter students and counselors to have another resource to help students dream big and set future goals.

Testing Updates:

High School Placement Test

We are gearing up for our High School Placement Test on November 18th! If you have an incoming 8th grader and need to register, please visit https://alterhs.org/class-of-2028/#hspt.

ACT

Our juniors will take the state sponsored ACT on February 27th. The state of Ohio pays for this test, and we register the students on our end. We find our kids appreciate this opportunity as it gives them the chance to take the test in a familiar environment. More information will be given to juniors in the near future.

IOWA

Freshmen students will take the IOWA tests in February. This test is required by the state of Ohio to measure graduation readiness. Information will be sent to freshmen and parents in January.

Facts Grant & Aid Assessment

As we approach the busy holiday seasons of Thanksgiving and Christmas, another important date is quickly approaching. **December 1st** is the due date for the FACTS Grant and Aid assessment, Alter's named scholarships and admissions applications for the class of 2028.

At Alter, we work hard to make Catholic education affordable for every student. With the recent expansion of the state of Ohio's EdChoice scholarship program, all students can receive funding to defray the cost of tuition. The following tips will guide you through this application season:

- New students (incoming freshmen and others currently attending other high schools) must apply for admission to Alter High School to be considered for financial aid and scholarships.
- · All students must apply for or renew their EdChoice scholarships to receive financial aid and need-based named scholarships. For 2024-25, the EdChoice application/renewal process will begin in February 2024, so we will use 2023-24 EdChoice award data when making award decisions.
- 2022 tax documentation will be required to support the FACTS Grant and Aid assessment and a \$35 FACTS fee will be charged upon submission.
- · Award decisions will be communicated at the end of January 2024, prior to the enrollment due date.
- · Visit <u>alterns.org</u> to apply.

Nearly 40% of our current students are now paying less than half of our published tuition rate and 80% of the recent EdChoice expansion applications have yet to be awarded, so we know this percentage will grow. We encourage all families seeking financial assistance for the 2024-25 school year to use all available resources to reduce the cost of an Alter education. We look forward to assisting our families through this year's award season.

Alter Named Scholarships: An Opportunity to Learn & Earn

Thanks to dedicated and generous Alter benefactors, we have 39 named scholarships that will provide over 120 tuition grants to incoming and current students, totaling well over \$200,000 annually. The window to apply for one or more of our available scholarships is now and the application and reference process are seamless and completely online. For ease of navigation, the website categorizes our scholarships based on student status:

- ·Incoming freshman
- ·Current Alter students
- ·Both incoming and current Alter students

Within each of these categories, scholarships are either need- based or merit- based. Need-based scholarships require submission of an EdChoice Scholarship application along with a completed FACTS Grant & Aid Assessment. The online application essay is a means for students to express their personal achievements, talents, leadership, perseverance, kindness, faith, or other characteristics. This is a learning opportunity for students to capture in their own words, reasons for consideration of a scholarship. Their written essays are early practice for the collegiate application and scholarship process.

Named scholarships can also fill the tuition gap between EdChoice scholarships and other financial aid that a family can receive. Our goal is to provide as much assistance as possible to make an Alter education possible for those who aspire to be a Knight.

STEM Talk

On October 24th, Ms. Marie Ely educated our students at a STEM Talk about two very important aspects of our culture: money and military. Being the Deputy Chief of Finance for the Air Force Security Assistance and Cooperation Directorate (AFSAC), Ms. Ely spoke of what it took to run one of Ohio's largest employers: 30,000 employees at WPAFB with a salary of \$9 million/day! Ms. Ely began her career by graduating with a Business Administration degree and this has taken her to various programs within the Air Force for the last 25 years. Currently, she belongs to one of the tenants housed at WPAFB, the Air Force Life Cycle Management Center (AFLCMC) who is composed of many career fields: including program management, engineering, IT support and financial management (which is where Ms. Ely works). She has ridden in helicopters, bought with funding she managed; she experienced the Climatic Lab (maintained with monies she oversaw) where planes are tested in extreme weather conditions. Her field consists of cost, budget, financial and earned value analysis and is full of problem-solving experiences. Thank you, Ms. Ely, for sharing your career details with our students!




