# United in Faith and Community

Last week, I had the opportunity to go on a retreat with other Campus Ministers and Religion teachers in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. With a busy month ahead, the idea of driving down to Cincinnati and missing a whole day of my "to do list" was almost enough to make me not go. Throw a sprinkle of Catholic guilt in there along with my people pleasing ways, and sure enough I found myself driving down on I-75 to go on retreat. As we all know how these stories go, God wanted me there.

It was so delightful to BE on a retreat and not lead a retreat. Don't get me wrong, without a doubt one of my favorite things about my job and what I probably spend the most amount of time working on is retreats. However, for the first time in the past year and a half, I was not in charge! I didn't need to worry if we had the copies, music, if everyone was in the right place, etc. I simply just got to sit and listen to the voice of God.

Our retreat leader, Fr. Jason, gave two main reflections and gave us plenty of time to just pray and listen. It was during his last reflection that really seemed to resonate with my small group and myself that day. He asked us to look to our right and to our left and note that it was Christ who sat next to us. I have reflected on this idea many times in my own personal prayer life, but for some reason it struck me differently on this day. Perhaps it was because I was not sitting at a table with people I had previously known; I had met three of the people just that morning and I was being told they were Christ. Fr. Jason didn't say that they were the hands and feet of Christ. He didn't say they were the image of Christ. He didn't say they reflected Christ. He said: they ARE Christ. Whether I had known them my whole life, four hours, or a matter of seconds, he was right. They are Christ.

The theme for Catholic Schools week for 2024 which we celebrate at the end of the month is "United in Faith and Community." I love this theme and I think it is a perfect reflection for us here at Alter High School as I think those are two things we do well. I have seen and witnessed firsthand the commitment of this community to one another. All those retreats I have led and experienced have given me the front row seat to observe faithful witnesses and support for one another on our faith journeys. The faculty and staff are currently spending time during a homeroom period each Friday to lead a God Squad; following a prompt, they are putting their faith in action into our community to grow alongside our students.

Fr. Jason's reflection during the retreat brought up a quote I read from the theologian C.S. Lewis when I was in high school. It had a profound effect on my life then and it resurfaced when I was prompted to see Christ next to me. C.S. Lewis said in his book The Weight of Glory, "Next to the Blessed Sacrament itself, your neighbor is the holiest object presented to your senses."

As we kick off Catholic Schools Week at the end of this month, may we be reminded of Christ who sits next to us: in class, at work, during Mass, at a sporting event, on stage in the theater, etc. We are united as a Catholic school in faith and community when we can recognize Christ next to us. May our eyes and hearts be opened as we see the holiest object presented to our senses as the person God has placed right before us.

Peak season for scholarship searching and applying is here, so be sure to utilize all the resources you can to optimize your prospects for financial awards. Seniors will be receiving emails from our office in the coming weeks with further information on local scholarships, including links and instructions on how to access scholarship opportunities on Naviance. Don't forget to take advantage of the wonderful assistance Mrs. DeRosa can provide through Class 101 as well. We are all here to help in any way we can!

### Interested in participating in College Credit Plus (CCP) for the 2024-2025 school year?

A mandatory meeting will be held in late February and will be announced once the date is finalized. Our CCP coordinator from Sinclair Community College, along with both Alter counselors, will be offering an informational session for parents AND students. One parent and the student are required to attend. If you have any questions about CCP and would like to know if this may be an option for your family, this is the ideal time to learn more about it from the experts.

Here are some often asked questions regarding CCP that can help in deciding whether or not to participate:

### What kind of credit am I earning from CCP?

Students who participate in CCP earn high school and college credit simultaneously. This can help you begin your college education while finishing high school. Keep in mind that your grades in these classes must transfer to the college you ultimately attend, thus beginning your college GPA.

### When can students participate in CCP?

Classes are offered during Sinclair's fall, spring, and summer terms.

#### Are students responsible to pay for CCP classes?

Students who fill out the appropriate forms may apply for funding from the state of Ohio, which may cover your CCP costs. This is not a guarantee for private school students.

#### Can I take a class during the school day?

You may take a class during the school day but be prepared to be absent from Alter for 2-3 periods on class days to allow for class time and travel. If an Alter class that you need only occurs once a day and it is during the Sinclair course, you will not be able to enroll in that class at Sinclair. Also, keep in mind that you must be present at Alter for all 8 periods on days when you do not have classes at Sinclair. You will attend study halls on those days.

### Can I be enrolled in extra-curriculars and take CCP classes?

Some of the classes at Sinclair are offered at times that overlap with our after-school extra-curriculars.

### Do the academic calendars of Sinclair and Alter align?

No, thus CCP students should be prepared to have classes when Alter students are out of school and vice versa. This includes holiday breaks, spring break, summer break, etc.

# Social Media: A Benefit or a Risk?

Social media has become important in our everyday lives, especially for teenagers. Gone are the days of turning the TV on to get the news, weather, and learning about others. These platforms can expose teens to current events, allow them to interact with a wide variety of people, teach them about a variety of subjects, and for entertainment and self-expression. Social media that's humorous or distracting that provides a meaningful connection to peers and a wide social network might even help teens avoid depression.

As a parent or caregiver, you are the expert on your child. You know their strengths and areas of vulnerability. Unfortunately, social media use can negatively affect teens, distracting them, disrupting their sleep, and exposing them to bullying, rumor spreading, unrealistic views of other people's lives and peer pressure. Personally, I know that sometimes at night I start scrolling through one platform and an hour and a half to two hours has gone by and I realize I went down that rabbit hole. How can you help your teens be smart users of social media, avoiding harm, and gaining maximum benefits?

In researching constructive ways to curb the misuse of social media, I came across some helpful tips from the Mayo Clinic. Below is a summary of the steps you can take to encourage some of the negative effects caused by misuse of social media.

- ·Set reasonable limits. Talk about how to avoid social media interfering with activities, sleep, meals, or homework. Encourage a routine that avoids electronic media use while in bed. Set an example by following these rules yourself.
- ·Monitor social media accounts. Let your teen know that you'll be regularly checking social media accounts. You might aim to do so once a week or more. Make sure you follow through.
- •Explain what's not OK. Discourage gossiping, spreading rumors, bullying, or damaging someone's reputation, online or otherwise. Talk about what is appropriate and safe to share on social media. Teens often create posts without thinking about the consequences. Remind them that posts could surface on the internet years later, and damage opportunities for them.
- ·Encourage in person time with friends. This is particularly important for teens vulnerable to social anxiety disorder.
- ·Talk about social media. Ask about their use of social media and how it makes him or her feel. Remind your teen that social media is full of unrealistic images and lifestyles that are untrue.

Happy New Year from the Technology Team! As you are getting started with a new semester and making news year's resolutions, this is a great time to evaluate how you've organized yourself digitally.

How do you would answer the following questions:

- What worked well for you last semester regarding how you're digitally organized?
- What should you change to improve how you're organized and where you find your work?
- Do you need to create new file folders and OneNote Notebooks?
- What folders should be archived?
- What documents and emails could be deleted?
- How often do you restart your computer? (This should be done once a week on campus.)
- How often do you check your email? (This should be done twice daily, a.m. and p.m.)

The Technology Team can help you create your new folders and Notebooks if you don't remember how to do so. Come find us: Mrs. Jan Miller – 210; Mrs. Portman – 211; Mrs. Conner – 212. How is your computer? Do you need to have Mr. Dixon look at anything that is not working properly? If you have an issue, please stop in to see him in room 310.

Soon you will start to get notices that passwords must be changed. Please remember these important steps:

1.It must be changed on campus and on the school WIFI.

2.Once the password is changed, the computer must be restarted to sync with the server.

3.The password must include all the following: 1 capital letter, 1 lowercase letter, 1 number, 1 special character and be at least 8 characters long. It may not contain part of your name and cannot be one you have used the past 8 times you have changed your password.

4.If you want to use the same password for RenWeb, Moodle, textbook sites, and other sites you use on a regular basis, change those passwords at the same time.




Among its national award winners are journalists Diane Sawyer and Deborah Norville, and the current Governor of Alabama – Kay Ivey.



The Alter Knights are currently 10-3 (5-0 GCL). They won a tough battle on Friday at Badin 66-52. On Saturday, the Knights lost a close battle against Westminster Academy (FL). The Knights were down 18 at half, fought valiantly in the second half and even took the lead a few times in the fourth quarter, but ultimately lost by 1, 72-71. On Sunday, the Knights lost to Westerville North at Ohio Dominican. This week, the Knights only play on Friday at McNicholas. This will be another tough game as McNicholas is second in the GCL with a record of 9-4 (4-1 GCL) and has won five straight games. The program continues its strong season overall, as the Freshman team improved to 7-1 and the JV team is 7-2.





### Girls' Basketball

The girls' basketball team continues to have a strong season. The girls' faced McNicholas High School on Saturday, January 10th where they came out and finished with a strong lead of 53-35. The Lady Knights then took on Solon High School on Wednesday, January 14th where they fell by only 1 point with a final score of 43-42. # Wrestling

Last week, the Knights competed in the Catholic Invitational Tournament. This is a very prestigious tournament with a long history. The tournament was a great success as the Knights placed third amongst the smaller Catholic Schools and 8th overall out of 32 schools. The Knights only had 8 wrestlers out of 14 weight classes. The wrestlers placed as follows:

# **Swimming**




Last weekend the Alter Knights Swim team participated in the Southwest Classic swim meet. 2024 marked the 40th anniversary for the Southwest Classic which remains the largest invitational meet of its kind in the United States. This meet had 11 preliminary sites and approximately 112 schools with nearly 3,000 swimmers. The Knights had another strong showing at this meet qualifying a number of swimmers in finals. Alter's boys finished 30th with Nathan Kyre finishing 16th (400 IM), 14th (100 fly), 11th (200 fly) and 14th (100 breast); Hank McCall finished 11th (50 fly). On the girls side, they finished 7th with relays finishing 9th in the 400 Medley Relay (Nora Boillot, Emma Tenhundfeld, Annie Leibold and Emily Kyre), 4th in the 200 Free Relay (Emma T., Sarah Morrison, Annie L., and Emily K.) and 6th in the 400 Free Relay (Emma T., Sarah M., Annie L., and Emily K.).

# FINAL FORMS REMINDER

With the spring sports' seasons just around the corner, please be reminded that Alter's Athletic Department is partnered with FinalForms, an on-line program which will enable you and your student to complete and file MOST athletic forms electronically. The ONLY form that you still need to print, have a physician complete and sign, and file with the Athletic Trainers, is the actual OHSAA Physical Form. Once a parent is registered on FinalForms, they will be able to access and print that form for their student's physician to fill out. The physical form must be completed by the doctor and by law Alter is required to have a signed copy on file. Once your student's completed physical is received by the Athletic Trainers, they will input the expiration date into FinalForms and then you will receive automatic notifications when your student's forms need to be updated (annually). 
