Happy New Year!

There are many points in the year (outside of January 1) that feel like new beginnings, and, for me, the start of a school year will always be one. In that spirit, I would like to share with you some of my "New Year's Resolutions" for the Admissions office.

1. Try new things.

It is almost time for the Class of 2029 to begin their admissions journey. With a new class, there are several new aspects to our admissions offerings:

- Shadow Days will begin September 12, 2024, and will be held most Thursdays between this date and the November application deadline. We encourage all prospective students to consider joining us to be a "Knight for a Day!" Registration is open on the Alter website (alterhs.org), and dates are filling up quickly!
- Our evening admissions events will be held on Tuesday, October 8 (Under the Armor: Arts, Athletics, and Spirit) and on Thursday, November 7 (Under the Armor: Academics, Admissions, and Faith). Registration for the October date is available on the Alter website, and registration for the November date is coming soon!
- The Admissions office will be holding open "office hours" throughout the months of October and November. During these specified hours, I will be available to answer questions, help with completing paperwork, and provide support to our applicants' families. Please look for the schedule in upcoming Alter Updates and on social media.
- 2. Lose some "wait."

Our new application for admission will open on September 1, 2024. All applications for the 2025-26 school year are due by Friday, November 15, 2024. Please note that this is a change from previous years. All scholarship and financial aid applications are also due on this date. The reason for this change is to lose some "wait"- particularly the wait for scholarship and financial aid award information.

In years past, admissions decisions were provided to applicants according to the guidelines of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, but scholarship and financial aid packages were not provided until two weeks later (at the time that the enrollment window was opened). The reason for this delay stemmed from the amount of time that it takes for our administrators and benefactors to decide on and allot assistance dollars. It is our hope that moving our application deadlines up by two weeks will ensure that we can provide applicants with a complete offer from Alter in mid-January, which will assist families in their discernment process.

3. Make new friends.

I absolutely cannot wait to meet the prospective students and families that will make up the Class of 2029! It is such a joy to work with our incoming Knights, and I am so excited to make some new friends and help them to find their place at Archbishop Alter High School. Wishing you all the best in this "New Year!" Cheers!

Altering Your Academic Path

Welcome to the 2024-2025 school year. Summer is quickly coming to an end, and as it draws to a close, I hope you take the time to reflect and reminisce about what you learned and how you have grown. As we begin the new journey of a school year together, a quote from Harry Wong who was an advocate for helping teachers be effective for their students comes to mind. Mr. Wong said, "The most important day of a person's education is the first day of school, not graduation day." This statement is a great reminder for not only our teachers, but for our students as well. The path to graduation is filled with many challenges along the way. Some of these obstacles might present themselves as difficulties when transitioning back to school from summer break. Below are a few ways to overcome hurdles as the school year begins.

First, prepare mentally. Make a strong transition back to school by getting in the right mindset and by setting goals. Moving from summer break to a school routine is a normal thing to worry about, but do not focus on the end of summer, instead focus on the new beginning of the school year. Look at it as a time to reconnect with friends, the opportunity to start fresh academically in your classes and a chance for new accomplishments.

These combined with the items above will help reduce stress and overcome any obstacles that come your way academically as you move through the school year and continue the journey towards graduation.

Greetings and happy new school year from the Technology Team!

As we embark on the new school year, it is time to get yourself digitally ready for school. Here are a few things to think about: Did you clean out old files that you no longer need? Have you made your folders for your classes yet? Do you remember how to make your OneNote Notebooks? If not, here are the steps to create them:

- 1. Sign in to the web version of your email via the Alter home page
- 2. Click on the 9-dot grid (waffle) in the upper left corner of Outlook.
- 3. Select One Drive
- 4. In One Drive, click on the plus sign and click on Folder.
- 5. Name your folder OneNote Notebooks (enter the year if you want) and select a color that will stand out to you among your folders.
- 6. Click on the One Note Notebooks folder and open it to work inside of it to create your OneNote Notebooks.
- 7. Click on the plus sign again, this time selecting One Note Notebooks from the list below.
- 8. Name your notebook and hit create.
- 9. Your notebook opens in a new tab.
- 10. To sync your notebook to your tablet, you need to click on File and select Edit in Desktop App.
- 11. When you get the selection of options to pick from to open, please use Windows 10 version of OneNote.
- 12. Once you open it in your desktop app, you may close it and the tab for that Notebook, then start the process over for a new notebook.

Because this process is a bit confusing, we will offer a couple of help sessions to make sure you save your notebooks properly. Next Tuesday, August 20th we will have sessions at 7:30 a.m. in room 210 and 3:15 p.m. in room 212.

We are excited to announce that we received new printers this summer for the print stations. The black and white printer is the smaller of the two printers. If you have any questions about printing, please let us know! We are here to help you with your computer needs; feel free to stop by or email at any time. Have a great 2024-2025 school year.

WHAT IS RANKED ABOUT?

Debuting just weeks after the College Admissions Scandal took the nation by storm, RANKED tells the story of a dystopian world where competition reaches new heights as publicized academic excellence defines each student's worth. 

JV ended their preseason on a high note with a commanding 3-0 victory over Beavercreek.


Our varsity remains optimistic despite a tough 0-2 loss in their preseason finale. The team is excited for regular season play.

Underclassmen Picture Day
