A Few Things About Financial Aid

Each month during the fall, I send a newsletter to prospective students and their families highlighting an aspect of the admissions process. In September, the focus of my newsletter is financial aid. Since all students at Alter are now able to apply for scholarships for the 2025-26 school year, and as many of our current families are points of contact for incoming Knights, I thought it might be helpful to include that information here, as well.

Archbishop Alter High School is committed to helping families find needed financial support. We want students to be able to attend our school and benefit from the rich educational, co-curricular, and faith-based experiences afforded to all Knights.

NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID

Once an application for admission is submitted to Alter High School, parents or guardians will be asked to complete and submit the FACTS Grant & Aid Assessment.

- ·This information is gathered by an outside entity (FACTS management) and is reviewed by this independent company to determine the level of financial aid Alter may award. All financial information submitted is kept strictly confidential.
- •The deadline for submitting the FACTS Grant & Aid Assessment is November 15th (which is the same date that applications for admission must be submitted).

SCHOLARSHIPS

Many scholarships have been established by members of the Alter community, and these awards are available for both incoming freshmen and current students. Scholarships may be need-based (the FACTS Grant & Aid Assessment is required) or merit-based (recognizing students for accomplishment in service, leadership, or academics). A complete list of scholarships can be found on our website under the "Scholarship" tab.

- **Between September 5th and November 15th** (the scholarship application window), complete and submit the Scholarship Acknowledgement Form.
- Again, first-year students must have a completed Alter High School Application on file with the school by
 November 15th to be considered for a scholarship, and if applying for a need-based scholarship, a FACTS Grant &
 Aid Assessment must also be submitted by November 15th. Families can apply for multiple scholarships.
- Most scholarships require both an application and an essay, and some require a reference (which must be a non-family member). References are also due by November 15th and can be submitted through an online link on the scholarship page.
- Families whose child qualifies for an award will be notified by email and the award will post directly to the student's tuition account in FACTS. These notifications will be sent on Friday, January 17th, 2025, with admissions decisions.

If you have any questions about financial aid at Alter, please feel free to reach out to the Admissions office. I am always happy to talk through your individual situation and help with the process.

Named Scholarship Application Portal is Open!

Current and prospective students who desire to apply for one or more Named Scholarships available from Alter for the school year 2025-2026 can access the online application portal until November 15, to apply for both merit and need based scholarships. We encourage EVERYONE to consider this option to reduce their tuition obligation for next year.

Alter has available 40 named scholarships for next year:

- Annual awards range from \$500 to 50% of our published tuition rate
- Named scholarship awards are classified into need-based (demonstrated financial need) and merit-based (academic, faith, and/or service)
- Some scholarships are renewable for one or more years
- The scholarship application process, including outside references, is completely online.
- DEADLINE for applying is November 15, 2024.

Seniors:

Another busy college application season is underway, and the Class of 2025 is already moving at a fast pace! They have been doing a fantastic job of staying on top of all the steps in the process. Please be reminded of the following deadlines for submission of transcript requests:

- ·Applications with a November 1st deadline must be received in the Guidance office by Tuesday, October 1st.
- ·Applications with a December 1st deadline must be received in the Guidance office by Friday, November 1st.
- Applications needing to be mailed prior to Christmas break must be received in the Guidance office by Friday, November 15th.

High school transcripts required for college admission are only being requested via Naviance. Utilizing this software is tremendously useful for students, counselors, and admissions offices. Naviance aids greatly with communication and timely submission of materials. If students need help accessing their Naviance account, please have them contact their individual counselor. The yellow folder must be returned to Guidance once seniors are ready to have transcripts sent. At any time, if you have questions or concerns regarding this often-stressful process, please don't hesitate to speak to one of the counselors.

Attention Senior Parents: Please join us for our **College Financial Aid Night** which will be held on **Wednesday, November 13th at 6:45 p.m.** in **Alter's Theatre.** This informational session will provide much needed advise and direction on the financial aid process for both public and private universities.

Juniors:

An important email was sent to students and parents in the junior class to provide all the details about visits from college admissions staff. These individuals represent schools from around the country and will be stopping by Alter this fall. For details on schools visiting, all the times and dates, and to sign up, please see Mrs. Waag the main Guidance office.



SENIORS

From September to November, we hope that all Alter seniors will visit the Taylor Center with their college application questions. We have resources to help brainstorm essays, draft activity descriptions, choose majors, advise on test score reporting, and more.

JUNIORS

This is the right time to build your college list. Remember to attend the college admissions visits at Alter! Juniors can sign up in the guidance office or by emailing <u>cathy.waag@alterhs.org</u>

SOPHOMORES

This is the right time to draft your resume and start thinking about colleges. We are here in the Taylor Center to help with both!

BUILDING THE COLLEGE LIST

For the Classes of 2025, 2026, and 2027, connecting with colleges can start now. It is not too late for seniors or too early for sophomores! Fall is a good time to brainstorm a big college list and start demonstrating interest through subscribing to admissions emails (and reading them!), scheduling visits, attending college events (including visits to your high school), and following college admissions' social media accounts.

A number of factors help Class 101 students define their college lists: location and geography, the student's college fit preferences, family expectations, and academic program information. For a few students, their area of study has to be a primary consideration. If they would like to major in something few schools offer, then the college list is first shaped by the student's area of interest. Extracurricular interests like sports or music might also narrow the list. At times, family legacy is a primary influence on the list.

Start with a broad list of schools that includes a smaller school (less than 5,000 students), a mid-sized school (5,000 to 12,000 students), a large school (12,000 to 25,000 students), and an extra-large school (more than 25,000 students). Consider urban, suburban, college town, and rural options. It is just as important to visit the community as it is to visit the college.

Students can explore colleges by comparing the majors and programs of study and reading the course descriptions of classes they are likely to take in their freshman year. We encourage in-person or virtual visits to talk with professors and students. With some visits shaping their perspectives, students can then begin to define their expectations for college, including study abroad, honors programs, housing options, internships and co-ops, undergraduate research opportunities and grants, and extracurriculars.

It is not uncommon for students' preferences to change during high school and even after they submit applications. U.S. News and World Report reports that one in three first year college students will drop out or transfer before their second year of college. And the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center Report (June, 2024) celebrated a rise in the national college (first to second year) retention rate for the first time in a decade to only 68.2%. These statistics should not be excused. The best antidote is strong college research and visits throughout high school. A wide-reaching and well-researched list of colleges is the cornerstone of a successful college application season and college experience. If your student wants to work on their college list, they can visit Class 101 in the Taylor Center every Wednesday and Thursday.

Alter's Positive Climate = Student Success

As the school year progresses, think back to what your high school community looked like, and your relationships with your teachers. Would you say that your community had a positive environment? Recent studies show, "When a school community has a positive climate, it will experience a stronger sense of community, higher student and family engagement, and greater student academic achievement" (schoolclimate.org). I would define Alter's school climate as the way the school environment functions to nurture students' physical, mental, and emotional well-being. This nurturing in our building is seen in a variety of ways inside and outside of the classroom. At Alter, our teachers strive to maintain our mission of challenging students to reach their full potential by providing academic excellence. In an ongoing effort to preserve our mission, along with our school identity, our teachers are constantly evaluating what they teach, why they teach, and if the information taught has not only been grasped by our students but the impact our teaching has on our students. To accomplish both a positive atmosphere and a strong academic one, teachers use textbooks, published resources, and the teachers themselves as living examples of the curriculum. As a former English teacher, I know that the relationships we build with our students have a strong impact on how well they do in our classes. For students to be successful, they need to be challenged, but they also need to know that their teachers care about them.

If your child is struggling in a class, please encourage them to reach out to their teacher for help. Approaching their teacher provides them with the best resource for what is going on in that classroom and is one step towards their flourishing academically. Teachers are here to help students before school begins at 7:30 a.m. and after school until 3:30 p.m.

As we quickly move through the first quarter, here are a few reminders to help you and your child navigate the start of the school year successfully:

·Check your child's grades in FACTS.

- ·If an "I" is entered into the gradebook, it signifies an incomplete and is calculated as a zero until the work is made up.
- ·If an "E" is entered the student is excused from the assignment.
- If your child is failing a subject, watch for a weekly Progress Report from their teacher.

Our first quarter ends on October 4th. To become a successful Knight in a positive climate, remember that it requires desire, dedication, hard work, and the ability to ask for help when it is needed.

It is time to take a deep breath and evaluate how our students and families are doing. High school is a time where students become more independent in many ways. Trying to help them exhibit their independence but still guiding their path quietly is always a struggle. What are some ways to accomplish this goal?

- Encourage your children to advocate for themselves. Let them take the lead on emailing teachers about
 grades and assignments. Watch your children take steps towards adulthood but still be close enough to
 catch them if needed.
- Trust your children until they give you a reason not to. It is terrifying not knowing all the ins and outs of your child's day. Ask questions about their grades and progress in classes and the friends they have met at school. Try not to assume that they are not telling you everything.
- Volunteer at your kids child's activities. Help out at the events they are involved in, like selling snacks at the concession stand, bringing meals for away games, or chaperoning a dance. They may not act like they like it, but they really want you to be around.
- Go to as many of the high school experiences as you can. Remember it all goes by so fast. Go to their performances, events, matches and games. Cheering for your child and the children of others is just so much fun! And it is a good way to get to know their friends.
- Give yourself grace. Navigating high schoolers is a tough job. But as long as your heart is in the right place and the best interest of your child is your guide, it will be ok. Don't beat yourself up when things don't go perfectly.

As I remind parents and students every day, we are on this journey together. It is difficult for parents to let go of their children and watch them grow and manage their own lives. Having four graduates of Alter while I was a teacher here was a challenge for me too. I had to remind myself and my children that I planted the seeds of responsibility in them, but they had to water those seeds so eventually they became the wings of independence. Now that I see them flying, I understand the importance of allowing them to begin to manage their independence.

The Tech Department would like to send out informational reminders regarding student computers. The student computers are covered under warranty. The warranty does not cover the battery of the computer, the stylus, charger, or sleeve. If something happens to any of the items that are not covered, then the family is responsible for replacement. At the end of this article, please find the links for re-ordering a stylus and charger. Make sure to click the proper link for your student's device. If your student has an issue with their computer, please have them take it to Mr. Dixon in room 310 to assess the issue. If it needs to be repaired, he will take care of it as soon as possible.

On October 9th, the juniors will take the PSAT. The PSAT will be taken using the students' computers. In the coming weeks the tech department will visit the junior theology class and help the students set up Bluebook. To be successful on test day, it is important for the students to remember to charge their computer completely the evening before the test. On test day, the juniors must bring their device and charger with them to school. Part of the pretest procedures will be to restart computers on campus and shut down any apps that automatically run, such as Spotify, so they do not interfere with the test. If you are having any issues with your computer, please let us know before testing begins so you can properly take the test on October 9th.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Rachel Cox '89 Has Had Continued Success in Music and Writing

Rachel Cox graduated from Alter in 1989. Since her graduation, she has had a successful career in both music and writing. A violinist and violist, Rachel has performed with the Naples Philharmonic, The Florida Orchestra, Sarasota Orchestra, Charlotte Symphony Orchestra, Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Isabella Stuart Gardner Museum Chamber Orchestra. She has been a member of the Southwest Florida Symphony Orchestra since 1998, holding the positions of principal viola, acting assistant and principal second violin, and acting assistant concertmaster. Rachel holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Viola Performance from the New England Conservatory in Boston, where she studied with Walter Trampler, and a Master's Degree in Business Administration from IMPAC University in Punta Gorda, Florida. Performance credits include a performance in Carnegie Hall under the baton of Michael Tilson Thomas, broadcasts on WGBH-FM "Off the Record" program, guest artist at the 2006 Ohio Federation of Music convention, guest performer with the New York Viola Society, and two PBS nationwide broadcasts as a member of the Naples Philharmonic under the direction of Erich Kunzel. In 2002, Rachel started the music scholarship at Florida Gulf Coast University that ultimately led to the formation of the Bower School of Music.

Rachel has published six books on Ohio and U.S. history, which are used in schools, libraries, and colleges throughout the United States and in Europe. In 2008 she published her first novel, The Horror Within. In 2011 she published A New Era: A History of the Southwest Florida Symphony Orchestra, which was written to commemorate the 50th anniversary of that orchestra and is the basis of a short documentary. Rachel is the author of Ecce Cecilia, a poem set to music for chorus and orchestra by Paul Richards in honor of the Southwest Florida Symphony Orchestra's 50th anniversary celebration. In 2012 she published Redemption, a one-act play which explores how crime traumatizes both the victim and the perpetrator. Rachel is also the historian for the Regional Orchestra Players' Association, a conference of the American Federation of Musicians. Rachel is presently a professor of violin and viola at Florida Southwestern State College in Fort Myers and an instructor for the Florida Gulf Coast University Academy. In 2017, in conjunction with two other members of the Music Foundation of Greater Naples, Rachel launched the Musical Moments Series at the Center for Performing Arts in Bonita Springs, the first year-round concert series in Southwest Florida.



Theresa Charters '84 Gavorone Serves as Ohio State Senator and Majority Whip

Upon graduating from Alter in 1984, Theresa has accomplished a tremendous amount in her career. Graduating from both Bowling Green State University and the University of Toledo College of Law, Theresa became an attorney. As a resident of Northern Ohio for over 35 years, she joined as a member of the Bowling Green City Council before serving in the Ohio Legislature. Theresa has been a State Senator for Ohio's 2nd District since 2019 and was elected to Senate leadership by her colleagues to serve as Majority Whip. Outside of her career in politics, Theresa has 3 kids and has lived in Bowling Green, Ohio for the last 32 years with her husband Jim. Together, they own a restaurant called Mister Spots in the town of Bowling Green which Theresa's husband Jim started 38 years ago. Theresa was quoted to say that "I would not be where I am today without the values that were instilled in me during my time at Alter."


DID YOU KNOW?

First STEM Talk of the Year: Mr. Joe Untener


