Peak season for scholarship searching and applying is here, so be sure to utilize all the resources you can to optimize your prospects for financial awards. All opportunities of which Guidance is aware are readily available to view on Naviance. A list of those scholarships can be found under the "Scholarships & Money" section under the "Colleges" tab in Naviance. Also, don't forget to take advantage of the wonderful assistance Class 101 can provide. We are all here to help in any way we can!

Interested in participating in College Credit Plus (CCP) for the 2025-2026 school year?

A representative from Sinclair Community College, along with both Alter counselors, will be offering a required informational session for parents AND students Wednesday, February 12th, at 6:45 p.m. in Alter's theatre. One parent and the student should be in attendance. If you have any questions about CCP and would like to know if this may be an option for your family, this is the ideal time to learn more about it from the experts.

Here are some often asked questions regarding CCP that can help in deciding whether or not to participate:

What kind of credit am I earning from CCP?

Students who participate in CCP earn high school and college credit simultaneously. This can help you begin your college education while finishing high school. Keep in mind that your grades in these classes must transfer to the college you ultimately attend, thus beginning your college GPA.

When can students participate in CCP?

Classes are offered during Sinclair's fall, spring, and summer terms.

Are students responsible for paying for CCP classes?

Students who fill out the appropriate forms may apply for funding from the state of Ohio, which may cover your CCP costs. This is not a guarantee for private school students.

Can I take a class during the school day?

You may take a class during the school day but be prepared to be absent from Alter for 2-3 periods on class days to allow for class time and travel. If an Alter class that you need only occurs once a day and it is during the Sinclair course, you will not be able to enroll in that class at Sinclair. Also, keep in mind that you must be present at Alter for all 8 periods on days when you do not have classes at Sinclair. You will attend study halls on those days.

Can I be enrolled in extracurriculars and take CCP classes?

Some of the classes at Sinclair are offered at times that overlap with our after-school extracurriculars.

Do the academic calendars of Sinclair and Alter align?

No, thus CCP students should be prepared to have classes when Alter students are out of school and vice versa. This includes holiday breaks, spring break, summer break, etc.

RESUME WRITING

COLLEGE LIST & EXPLORING MAJORS

All Juniors and Sophomores are invited to work on their college list and explore majors with Class 101 during their study hall. This is the ideal time to consider college fit preferences, plan ahead for spring break and summer college visits, and understand the admissions requirements for various colleges.

UNDERSTANDING ENROLLMENT & COLLEGE OFFERS: March and April

Seniors are always welcome to visit the Taylor Center to review their acceptances and financial aid/scholarship offers from colleges with Class 101. Many seniors have received acceptances. However, others will not know decisions from all of their schools until as late as April. This is okay! Every school handles the admissions timeline differently. If you are waiting to hear, don't get discouraged. Also note that some schools that have accepted you may start enticing you to enroll early with promises of better housing choices or money for books. We recommend waiting to send in an enrollment deposit until you've heard from all your schools AND have received their formal financial aid offers. There are exceptions for living-learning communities or other specialized housing options at some schools. Please reach out to us anytime with questions.

Calling Attention to Graduation Seals and Honors Diploma Changes

As the world continues to advance in technology and its expectations in society, so to must education change to help prepare students for success. The state of Ohio has implemented changes to the honors diploma and graduation seals to ensure that students graduate with skills and qualifications that align more closely with the workforce demands and postsecondary education requirements of today. These updates provide a pathway for students to showcase their readiness for college, career, or military service by earning seals that highlight their strengths in specific areas creating a more well-rounded picture of their capabilities beyond just test scores. By offering a range of options, the state aims to ensure that all students are prepared for their chosen futures. At Alter High School we too need to make sure we continue to align with the requirements of the state. Below is an overview of the Ohio Graduation Seals and the new requirements for the Honors Diploma.

Understanding Ohio Graduation Seals: Preparing Your Child for Success

Ohio Graduation Seals are an important part of the state's high school graduation requirements, designed to display students' readiness for college, careers, and life after high school. These 12 seals allow students to personalize their educational journey by demonstrating achievements in areas such as academics, leadership, technical proficiency, and community service. To graduate, Alter students must earn at least two seals, one of which must be state defined. These seals not only fulfill graduation requirements but also serve as a meaningful reflection of students' skills, interests, and potential future paths. Alter's current curriculum requirements play a vital role in guiding students through the process of earning graduation seals. Additional information on which Seals may be earned will be defined in the 2025-2026 Program of Studies.

Academic Honors Diploma: Recognizing Academic Excellence

The Honors Diploma is a prestigious recognition for students who go above and beyond the standard graduation requirements. Ohio's High School Academic Honors Diploma requirements for this diploma are changing with the class of 2026, therefore Alter's requirements will change to align with the state. The new Honors Diploma requires students to meet all but one of the criteria. Each of these criteria go beyond the standard requirements for graduation. Details regarding these new requirements may be found in the table below as well as the upcoming 2025-2026 Program of Studies.

3. Organization begins on day 1:

Steps to Get Organized:

- o Clean Out the Backpack: Remove papers, notebooks, $\&\,$ supplies not needed.
- o Update Your Supplies: Restock essentials like pens, paper, and folders. Again, new teachers, new supplies.
- o Create a Dedicated Study Space: Change up the study space.

4. Strengthen Positive routines so they become habits:

- o Review Daily: Spend 10-15 minutes each evening reviewing notes.
- o Ask Questions: Don't hesitate to seek help if you don't understand something.
- o Stay Active: Regular exercise and a healthy diet contribute to better focus & energy levels.

5. Communicate:

- o Talk to Teachers: they are there to help.
- o Form Study Groups: Offer to host a study group at your house or suggest another location such as the library or a coffeehouse.

- How often do you restart your computer? (This should be done once a week on campus.)

How is your computer? Do you need to have Mr. Dixon look at anything that is not working properly? If you have an issue, please stop in to see him in room 310.

Soon you will start to get notices that passwords must be changed. Please remember these important steps:

- 1.It must be changed on campus and on the school WIFI.
- 2.Once the password is changed, the computer must be restarted to sync with the server.
- 3. The password must include all the following: 1 capital letter, 1 lowercase letter, 1 number, 1 special character and be at least 8 characters long. It may not contain part of your name and cannot be one you have used the past 8 times you have changed your password.
- 4.If you want to use the same password for RenWeb, Moodle, textbook sites, and other sites you use on a regular basis, change those passwords at the same time.

If you are having issues with your computer, please come see us so we can get them taken care of for you. Seniors, please make sure you see us with any issues like broken screens or missing keys by the end of February so these things are fixed before the end of the year when your warranty runs out.

Toiletries for Teens Campaign



Castle Players Continue to Gear Up for Mean Girls




Gymnastics


